

## Appendix P

### PARLIAMENTARY AND GLA ELECTIONS IN HARROW, 2002-2019

This Appendix presents results for Parliamentary, European Parliament, Mayor of London and Greater London Assembly (GLA) Elections. The format is similar to the main results tables except for the inclusion of an extra column showing the % share of the vote achieved by each candidate. An asterisk (\*) indicates a forfeited deposit. Turnout is based on the number of valid votes cast, and a cross (+) before the name of a candidate in 2005 indicates a member of the previous (2001-2005) Parliament, or in 2004 indicates a member of the previous (2000-2004) GLA or the previous (1999-2004) European Parliament.

At the 1999 European Parliament Election an ordered party regional list (without choice) form of proportional representation was used for the first time. Seats were allocated between lists in proportion to the votes received using the d'Hondt (largest average) method. (See E. Lakeman and J.D. Lambert, *Voting in Democracies*, Faber and Faber, London, 1955, p. 87.) Harrow formed part of the London region, which returned 10 MEPs. For the first time voting statistics at the Parliamentary constituency level were made available. As a result of 10 new member states joining the European Union in May 2004, the total number of MEPs from the United Kingdom was reduced from 87 to 78 at the 2004 election. As a consequence, representation for London fell from 10 to 9 MEPs. A further enlargement of the European Union meant that at the June 2009 election the United Kingdom was entitled to a total of 72 MEPs and the representation of London dropped from 9 to 8 members. In December 2011 a 73rd member from the UK (Anthea McIntyre, Conservative, West Midlands constituency) was allocated to England because of the implementation of the Treaty of Lisbon. At the end of January 2020 MEPs from the UK retired from the European Parliament following the withdrawal of the UK from the European Union.

Like 2000, the 2004 and subsequent Mayor of London elections used the Supplementary Vote system. If no candidate secured over half of the first choice votes, then all but the top two candidates were eliminated. Any valid second choice votes from those eliminated were allocated to the two candidates left in the race.

Like 2000, the 2004 and subsequent Greater London Assembly was elected by an Additional Member System. Fourteen members were elected from traditional constituencies by the first-past-the-post method. The London Boroughs of Brent and Harrow were combined to form one of these constituencies. Voters also cast ballots for the additional eleven members of the GLA, by voting for a party list or for individual candidates. Having taken into account seats won by each party from the constituencies, the additional seats were allocated (using the d'Hondt formula) among those parties winning over 5% of the entire London vote. (See *Electing the Mayor and the London Assembly*, a pamphlet published by the Electoral Reform Society, for further information. Alternatively, consult House of Commons Library Research Paper 00/53: *The Local Elections and Elections for a London Mayor and Assembly, 4 May 2000*.) It is likely that the voting system continued to cause considerable confusion at the 2004 election: there were many rejected ballot papers, especially for the constituency member of the GLA. The 2020 Mayor of London and GLA election was postponed for a year under the provisions of section 57(1) of the Coronavirus Bill 2020; section 57(2) extended the term of office of the Mayor and Assembly Members by a year to May 2021.

Candidates at Parliamentary elections forfeited their deposit of £500 if they secured less than 5.0% of the valid poll. Political parties or individual candidates were required to lodge a deposit of £5,000 for European Parliament elections, but this was returned if 2.5% or more of the valid poll was secured. Candidates for Mayor of London forfeited their £10,000 deposit if polling less than 5.0%, whilst GLA constituency candidates were required to lodge a £1,000 deposit with the threshold also 5.0%. The deposit figure for political parties or individual candidates contesting GLA list elections is £5,000, returnable with 2.5% or more of the valid poll.

Ms. Blackwell was the mother of Josh McGuinness, one of three young men who lost their lives in January 2018 when on their way to a birthday party in Hayes; a car mounted the pavement they were walking along and struck them with considerable force. She was dissatisfied with the Police investigation and believed a "cover-up" had taken place.
