HENDON UNION BOARD OF GUARDIANS: ELECTION RESULTS, 1894-1928

Boards of Guardians were founded as a result of the Poor Law Amendment Act 1834, which replaced parish Overseers of the Poor established under the old poor law. Following this legislation, Hendon Union Board of Guardians was formed in May 1835 from the parishes of Edgware, Harrow-on-the-Hill, Hendon, Kingsbury, Pinner, Great Stanmore, Little Stanmore and Willesden.

Each Board was composed of Guardians elected by the owners and *bona fide* occupiers of land liable to pay the poor rate. Depending on the value of the property held, an elector could cast from one to three votes. Electors could nominate proxies to cast their vote in their absence. Where property was held by a corporation or company, its governing body could nominate an officer to cast its vote or votes.

The Local Government Act 1894 altered the system; members of newly established rural district councils became guardians for their areas, with separate poor law elections being limited to urban areas. At the same time, property qualifications were abolished, plural voting was ended and women were able to become Guardians. Additionally, the term of office of a Guardian was increased to three years. At this time Harrow Weald, Wealdstone and Wembley were added to the Hendon Union.

By 1895, the Hendon workhouse at Edgware had become extremely overcrowded. Since many inmates came from Willesden Parish, it was decided to set up a separate workhouse at Willesden, and in 1896 the Local Government Board ordered that Willesden should leave the Hendon Union and operate as an independent Poor Law District.

Poor Law Unions were abolished by the Local Government Act 1929 which passed responsibility for public assistance to county and county borough councils in 1930. The Hendon Union Board of Guardians held its last meeting on 28 March1930, the proceedings closing with the singing of the National Anthem. Dr. A. Findlater, on behalf of the officers of the Union, presented the Chairman, John Bransgrove, with a pair of silver candlesticks.

During research for this book most of the Board of Guardians election results for Harrow-on-the-Hill, Wealdstone and Kingsbury have been discovered. Tabulated below are the results of these elections insofar as they are known, although some information for events in the 1920s remains to be confirmed. It appears that (with few exceptions — recorded in footnotes) all candidates stood on a non-party basis. It has been assumed that the number of electors at each election was the same as the simultaneously-held UDC election.

<u>Note</u>: Hawkins was the only candidate nominated at the election, leaving the second seat vacant. At a Board meeting on 17 January 1895 the Clerk reported that he had received a letter from the Local Government Board stating that they would "shortly issue an order as to the method of filling the casual vacancy." On 14 February the Clerk informed a meeting of the Guardians that "the County Council have the matter in hand: Mr. Copland Crawford and Mr. Job are candidates for the seat." However, at a meeting on 9 May it was reported that an Order had been received from the Middlesex County Council appointing Risk to fill the vacancy. Risk attended his first meeting on 6 June 1895.

The MCC invited the remaining Guardians to propose the name of a person willing to accept office so that they could make an Order under the Local Government Act 1896. This resulted in Dale's appointment and he attended his first meeting of the Board on 30 August 1906.
