PARLIAMENTARY AND GLA ELECTIONS IN HARROW, 2022-2024

This Appendix presents results for Parliamentary, Mayor of London and Greater London Assembly (GLA) Elections. The format is similar to the main results tables. An asterisk (*) indicates a forfeited deposit. Turnout is based on the number of valid votes cast, and a cross (+) before the name of a candidate in 2024 indicates a member of the previous (2019-2024) Parliament, or a member of the previous (2021-2024) GLA.

Polling dates for the elections were as follows:

Parliamentary 2024 Thursday 4 July

Mayor/GLA 2024 Thursday 2 May

Unlike previous Mayor of London elections that used the Supplementary Vote (SV) system, the 2024 election used the traditional 'First Past the Post' (FPTP) method. The change resulted from provisions contained in the Elections Act 2022.

Like its previous elections, the Greater London Assembly's 25 members were elected by an Additional Member System (AMS). Fourteen members were elected from traditional constituencies by FPTP, with the London Boroughs of Brent and Harrow combined to form one of these constituencies. Voters also cast ballots for the additional eleven members of the GLA, by voting for a party list or for individual candidates. Having taken into account seats won by each party from the constituencies, the additional seats were allocated (using the d'Hondt formula) among those parties winning over 5% of the entire London vote. Candidates at Parliamentary elections forfeited their deposit of £500 if they secured less than 5.0% of the valid poll. Candidates for Mayor of London forfeited their £10,000 deposit if polling less than 5.0%, whilst GLA constituency candidates were required to lodge a £1,000 deposit with the threshold also 5.0%. The deposit figure for political parties or individual candidates contesting GLA list elections is £5,000, returnable with 2.5% or more of the valid poll.

She was a Labour councillor in Headstone ward in Harrow from May 2014 until November 2021 when she was expelled from the party for her links to *Socialist Appeal*, the newspaper of the British section of the International Marxist Tendency. Among her policies at this election was a call for “justice for Palestine [and] an immediate cease-fire in Gaza.”

In accordance with the Greater London Election Rules 2007 and Rule 10 of the Mayoral Election Rules, the Greater London Returning Officer determined the nominations were invalid: the candidates' nomination papers were not subscribed as required (Rule 10(2) (a) and (b)).

Ms. Campbell was a businesswoman who had unsuccessfully applied for the Conservative Party candidature.
