1934-1939: The main RA group in the ward was the Wealdstone Ratepayers' Association.

1934: Searcy was a former member and Chairman of Wealdstone Urban District Council. He announced in his election address: "My policy is briefly summed up in the word 'Onward', which is my motto."

1935: Mrs. Bailey stood as a "United Front Workers" candidate. She retired on the eve of poll on learning that the Labour Party was pledged to fight for abolition of Part II of the Unemployment Act.

1952: Jukes died in March 1954.
